Signs of the fortnight



Key Word Signs are a fantastic way of supporting your child's understanding and use of language. KWS are hand signs that are used to represent the main words or key words in a sentence. It is important to use spoken language alongside KWS to ensure that your child also hears the spoken word.

Here are some greetings and manners that you can try at home. Have fun!



Good

Extend dominant thumb, close rest of fingers into fist, thumb pointing up, move forward with stress. (Natural gesture),



Hello

Move open dominant hand side to side in air at chest height, palm away from body. (Natural gesture).



Afternoon

Place dominant thumb into crooked index finger, other fingers closed. Hold formation close to chin. Flick thumb up and tap crooked intex finger against thin coop.



Morning

Pface dominant hand, bent at third knuckles into armpit on opposite side of body, and ta fingertips into armpit twice. "May use armpit on dominant side of body. (V. S. W. M.T. T.



Goodbye

Use dominant hand, palm forward and bend fingers onto palm, twice. Or may move spen dominant hand side to side in air at chest height, like "Hello". (Natural gesture).

Thanks

Move open dominant hand straight forward from chin, while closing Move fingertips of open dominant hand, palm towards body, forward into a fist. May use "thanks"

Move fingertips of open dominant hand, palm towards body, forward from chin, once. "May use two hands."

want

Move heel of open dominant hand down front of chest and turn to palm down.

Here are some signs used to request that you can try at home. Have fun!



more

Cup dominant hand, fingers spread and place fingertips on centre chest. Move hand forward.



drink

Shape dominant hand as for holding a glass – tilt to mouth as for drinking. (Natural gesture - mime the action).



eat

Close dominant fingertips onto ball of thumb.

Tap formation on chin, twice.



help

Place dominant hand bent at third knuckles, palm down, onto nondominant palm. Or may place dominant hand onto non-dominant hand, palms together. Move formation forward. * With directionality.



wait

Bounce open dominant hand, palm down, in front of dominant side, twice. 'May use both hands. (Natural gesture),



finished

Extend dominant thumb, fingers closed. Rock hand formation from side to side several times.

Multi-Modal Communication in Schools

When you register, you are registering to attend all three parts of the workshop. This workshop is offered to Victorian School Staff only.

Communication is complex and unpredictable. Opportunities to communicate for all people are constantly occurring and we choose the most efficient and effective strategy to communicate in each moment as it occurs. For the student with Complex Communication Needs (CCN), they require a range of different Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC) strategies to use at different times. No single strategy will be the most efficient or appropriate for all communication opportunities, therefore a range of communication strategies need to be implemented, and always available to the student. As speech pathologists and educators we have to implement these different strategies to a range of students with varying needs. This presents a number of challenges in an already busy school environment. So, how do we balance the needs of all students and work toward autonomous communication for all?

In this workshop we will:

- Discuss and explore the definition of autonomous communication.
- · Discuss the theory behind effective ways of communication intervention with a range of
- \cdot Explore a range of AAC strategies and tools and their possible uses and purposes in a school
- Update on current AAC technology and software available
- Identify opportunities to genuinely communicate across the school day. Provide practical solutions for use in and out of the classroom.
- Discuss possible tools and strategies for speech pathologists and teachers to gather information about their student's communication requirements
- Explore principles that guide effective AAC intervention.

On completion of this workshop series participants will be able to:

- Discuss a range of AAC strategies and tools available for students with CCN.
- Discuss the evidence base and reasoning behind Aided Language Stimulation.
- Identify communication opportunities both inside and outside of the classroom and the strategies that may be most effective to communicate at those times.
